Plague in the 21st Century?

The Black Death

The Black Death of the 14th century was one of the most devastating pandemics known. Many factors contributed to its virulence, but the cause was a bacterium, Yersinia pestis. Could such a pandemic occur today?

But this raises a question: Should a large-scale public health emergency occur, how do we inform the public and then distribute treatments rapidly and on a population-wide scale?

MEDS-POD and EMCOMM

The Rhode Island Department of Health has a Medical Emergency Distribution System (MEDS) plan to provide medical countermeasures to the public. In such an event, Points of Dispensing (PODs) would provide medical countermeasures to everyone.

On February 27th a multi-jurisdictional MEDS-POD Exercise was held. For the first time a Multi-POD was staffed on Aquidneck Island and our EMCOMM team was asked to provide communication support for the exercise.

The team set up 2-meter stations in the Command Center at Middletown High School and at the Middletown EOC.
