

Why Here?

- Resilience story British invasion *December 8*, 1776 October 1779 when 8000 troops occupied Aquidneck Island, burning an estimated 200 houses for firewood. Portsmouth coal pressed into service, but not commercially developed until 1808.

 - Commercial coal mining in Rhode Island began in 1808 near Portsmouth when coal was found in Cumberland between the Blackstone River and Abbotts Run, a little north of Pawtucket. The coal at Portsmouth seems to have been known at least as early as 1760. It is said that during the Revolutionary War the British soldiers in Newport used the coal from the island for heating purposes. The Portsmouth coal venture operated until 1912; over a million tons of anthracite was mined.

- 1808-1913, main South Shaft on site of now Carnegie Tower, but the coal operation extended 700 acres:
 - from Cory's Lane to Bristol Ferry and across the island under Butts Hill Fort, Portsmouth High School the wind turbine and over to another coal mine shaft near Sprague St.

By 1910, this coal mine was producing 400 tons/day of compacted briquettes



You can also activate this site from the Willow Lane Public Boat Ramp Parking, clearly marked off Elliot St near the end of Willow Lane (formerly Coal Mine Lane)



- While traveling north on RI 114 North from Portsmouth to Bristol, bear left at the entrance ramp to RI-24 to stay on RI-114. The Patriots Park pulloff is immediately on your left.
- In June 2021 the Butts Hill Fort was added to POTA site site K-4582, the Washington Rochambeau (multi-state) Trail. There is a Portsmouth organization planning to develop the site in time for the commemorative events of the 250th anniversary of the Battle of Rhode Island in 2028.
